Thank you for joining us for our 2023 Connecting Chords Music Festival! We have a great lineup of events, similar to our pre-2020 Festivals. Our schedule – which may seem more spread out than in the past – reflects our efforts to engage artists when they are already touring through our area; this helps reduce our costs as well as the impact of their travel on the environment.

We are featuring new and returning artists, in both familiar and new-to-us indoor venues. We retain some of the outdoor programming created during the pandemic, recently presenting area artists at the **Dr. T.K. Lawless Dark Sky Park** on August 18 and **Migratory Music** at the Kalamazoo Nature Center on September 16. We continue with another popular outdoor location, new to us last season – **Kleinstuck Preserve** – for an October 14 event which involves a short trail walk into a performance in this beautiful natural setting.

Our 2020-21 hybrid events, the **Resonance Project** and **Music in Place** (celebrating our community with a musical map of treasured locations) are still available to experience on our website.

We are proud of the innovative projects and events we created to keep music in our lives and keep the shared experience of music possible. We continue to look for new ways to connect with our community; we are pleased to be collaborating with **K-RESA Education for the Arts** in presenting **The String Queens**, and we are delighted to have formed a partnership with **Rootead**, funded in part by a MACC Community Partner grant.

The support from our donors and funders continues to sustain us. Our many community partners – too numerous to mention in this welcome note – continue to help us connect with our community in meaningful ways. We are pleased to be partnering again with the **Kalamazoo County Juvenile Home** to bring our artist **Rahim AlHaj** to visit their students.

We believe it is truly "sacred" to focus some of our funds locally – celebrating and supporting our area artists – while also bringing in unique artists who reflect aspects of our mission: cultural preservation, differences and commonalities of various belief systems, and community building.

As we move into the 2023-24 season, we trust we will all continue to enjoy the thrill and value of live performances, as well as the excitement of hearing different genres of music in a variety of locations.

Our partnership with Rootead and Ayodele Drum & Dance

We are excited this year to partner with **Rootead** for a project funded, in part, by a Michigan Arts and Culture Council Community Partner grant, which we were awarded on September 22, 2023.

Rootead is a nonprofit organization that centers on the lived experiences of Black, Indigenous and People of Color by

providing connection and support through birth justice, youth empowerment, and community healing. Included in these activities are drum and dance classes for all ages, as well as youth and professional adult drum and dance groups.

This project brings together our organization and Rootead in presenting a series of drum and dance workshops in Rootead's teaching venue with members of Chicago-based **Ayodele Drum & Dance**. These visits will culminate in Ayodele's full ensemble participation in Rootead's December celebration events, including a free public performance. The MACC funds will help support the presence of members of Ayodele for these workshops and final performance on **December 16** at Comstock Auditorium. Stay in touch with us for further details!

As part of this partnership, performers from Rootead will appear in a 6:30 PM pre-concert event prior to the Festival performance by The String Queens on November 7 at Comstock Auditorium.

- Step 2 Go, listen, and think about the incredible variety of ways that three musicians can communicate with one another and an audience.
- **Step 3** Find me after the festival, have a beverage and geek out about what we've heard. (No essay required.)

In the spirit of combining the familiar and the unfamiliar, the local and the global, we hope that you will sample liberally from the music presented this fall. Bring a friend with you when you come. Or make a new one when you arrive! Thanks to the generous support of our donors and sponsors – and your ticket purchases – I can say with confidence that if you listen to enough Connecting Chords, you will hear something that you've never heard before.

As you partake of this year's musical offerings, please keep an eye out for me or any of the other board members, identifiable by our nametags. We are always happy to meet fellow music lovers, to hear about your ideas for the festival, and to chat about how you might be able to get more involved in Connecting Chords.


Internationally renowned organist **David Briggs** will improvise the score for the 1920 silent-film classic *Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* starring John Barrymore.

In this film based on the Robert Louis Stevenson story, Dr. Henry Jekyll's enthusiasm for science and his selfless acts of service have made him a much-admired man. An encounter at a social gathering leads him to meddle with the darker side of science, wanting to bring out his "second" nature.

After extensive work in his laboratory, Jekyll devises a formula that allows him to alternate between two completely different personalities – his own and that of a brutish person whom he names Mr. Hyde. It is not long before the personality of Hyde begins to dominate Jekyll's affairs.



Friends of the Gamelan

Traditional music of central Java in Indonesia

Friends of the Gamelan is a Chicago-based community group dedicated to the performance, instruction and promotion of gamelan, traditional ensemble music of the Javanese, Sundanese, and Balinese peoples of Indonesia, performed predominantly with percussive instruments.

Affectionately know as FROG, the group traces its roots to the World's Columbian Exposition of 1893. Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History was founded to preserve, catalog, and exhibit the many cultural treasures from this Exposition, including the gamelan.

In the late 1970s, a group began to meet regularly at the museum to play on those very instruments. FROG formed in 1980 as a not-for-profit educational organization to continue the work begun at the Field Museum.

Ukrainian klezmer music with a dose of rocket fuel

"In Odessa, people find togetherness. In Odessa, all will laugh and sing."

Ukraine's **Kommuna Lux** validates these words from an old poem, performing their own style called "Odessa Gangsta Folk" – thrilling klezmer music and common folk songs from their hometown, all with a dose of rocket fuel.
