We truly appreciate your joining us for our 2021 Connecting Chords Music Festival. We're taking small steps toward presenting a festival more reminiscent of our 2019 Festival, but shaped by our 2020 events.

We have all been stretched in many ways; we've had time for reflection, and we've had our creativity, resiliency and imaginations challenged since our 2019 Festival.

We at the Michigan Festival of Sacred Music (MFSM) are proud of the innovative projects and events we created to keep music in our lives and keep the shared experience of music possible. The continued support from our donors and funders kept us afloat financially. The wealth of energy and ideas coming from the MFSM Board and the flexibility and creativity of our Marketing Coordinator Eric Schmidt helped keep the enthusiasm going.

When we arrived at the point where we stopped thinking about what we couldn't do and began to think about what we could do, the flood of ideas was amazing. This also came with a commitment to give the community live musical experiences when possible, shared experiences when live was not possible, and a belief that it was truly "sacred" at this time to focus our funds locally, celebrating and supporting our area artists who have lost much work since the pandemic began.

Our **Resonance Music Project** (see page 26) – one of our first ideas which aligned with these new commitments – continues to have a meaningful life at the **Kalamazoo Institute of Arts**, and it will be part of **Kalamazoo RESA**'s Education for the Arts curriculum in the schools this year. Our **Music in Place** project (page 27) celebrates our community with a musical map of treasured locations.

The ability to present concerts outdoors led us to create a "Migratory Music" event in collaboration with the Kalamazoo Nature Center, showcasing area artists who perform music that has migrated to Kalamazoo from elsewhere. The first was so successful that we have now presented three of these events.

We also began a relationship with **Dr. T. K. Lawless Dark Sky Park** in Cass County, where our first music-under-the-stars event was so well received we have continued that relationship this fall.

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

Joel Mabus is a maverick in the music world. An award-winning folk singer, he defies any easy pigeonhole. By turns, he picks a mountain banjo to accompany an ancient ballad, sings a witty song about modern life, plays a sweet Irish melody on guitar, swings a hot jazz number, and then reaches deep for a soulful expression of values in a troubled world. He tops it all with a flatpicked fiddle tune or old ukulele song – all skillfully blended into a seamless flow. One fan said, "It's music from the heart that hits you right between the eyes."

A mainstay on the folk circuit these past 40 years, Joel has 27 albums to his credit; the latest is *Time & Truth*.














MIGRATORY MUSIC



Multi-instrumentalist, cellist and singer

This bilingual multi-instrumentalist, cellist and singer has been influenced by traditional Creole, Cajun and Haitian music, as well as by American jazz and folk. Her music is earthy, elegant, soulful and witty – it vibrates with three centuries of history, yet feels strikingly fresh, distinctive and contemporary.

Born in New York City to Haitian emigrant parents, Leyla was immersed in a meld of cultures from an early age. As a teenager, she relocated to Ghana for two years before returning to the States to study cello performance and chamber music at NYU. Armed with Bach's Cello Suites, Leyla left New York to play cello on the streets of the French Quarter in New Orleans.

She rose to fame as cellist of the Grammy-Award-winning African-American string band the Carolina Chocolate Drops before leaving the group in 2013 to pursue her solo career.

Leyla's debut album *Vari-Colored Songs: A Tribute to Langston Hughes*, was named 2013's Album of the Year by the *London Sunday Times* and *Songlines* for its haunting mixture of music and message. A limited release at the time, the album saw its re-release in October 2020, its topics

only amplified by the year's social and political unrest. "[The album] is an illuminating conversation between artists both past and present, and balm for the soul," said Bandcamp.



Leyla's 2016 album *A Day For The Hunter, A Day For The Prey* continued to explore themes of social justice, and included guests **Rhiannon Giddens, Marc Ribot**, **Louis Michot** of Lost Bayou Ramblers and others. Through deeply felt originals and interpretations of traditional songs,

the album depicts a diverse American experience and Leyla's struggles with and acceptance of her own cultural identity



2019 saw the release of *The Capitalist Blues*, a blend of New Orleans cajun, zydeco and Haitian jazz, with lyrics sung in English, French and Haitian Creole. "She's partly in the moment and partly looking beyond it, and seeing truths that we've missed," said NPR.



Following her solo release came the widely-acclaimed collaborative project *Songs of Our Native Daughters* (joined by **Rhiannon Giddens**, **Amythyst Kiah** and **Allison Russell**). The album pulled influences from past sources to create a reinvented slave narrative, confronting

sanitized views about America's history of slavery, racism, and misogyny from a powerful, modern black female perspective.

Leyla's latest project, *Breaking the Thermometer to Hide the Fever*, tells the legacy of Radio Haiti, Haiti's first privately owned Creole-speaking radio station – and the assassination of its owner – through Leyla's own Haitian-American lens.

Renowned musician **Amir ElSaffar** joins vocalist **Hamid Al-Saadi** to present the Iraqi *maqam*, incorporating jazz, classical and other Middle Eastern styles to create a highly unique and personalized sound.

The *maqam* is the classical vocal tradition of Iraq, one of the most refined of the many *maqam* traditions found throughout the Arab and Muslim world. In Iraq, the term refers to highly-structured, semi-improvised, centuries-old compositions that take years of disciplined study under a master to learn fully.

ABOUT AMIR ELSAFFAR

"Expanding the vocabulary of the trumpet and at the same time the modern jazz ensemble," (*All About Jazz*), **Amir ElSaffar** is an important voice in an age of cross-cultural music making. He has been described as "uniquely poised to reconcile jazz and Arabic music," (*The Wire*).

A 2018 US Artist Fellow and a recipient of the Doris Duke Performing Artist Award, ElSaffar is an expert trumpeter with a classical background; he speaks the language of contemporary jazz and utilizes techniques to play ornaments idiomatic to Arabic music not typically heard on the trumpet. He continues the Iraqi *maqam* tradition, performing actively as a vocalist and santur (hammered dulcimer of Mesopotamian origin) player.

ABOUT HAMID AL-SAADI

The only person in his generation to have memorized and mastered all 56 *maqamat* from the Baghdadi repertoire, **Hamid Al-Saadi** is keeping the *maqam* alive today, at a time when so many elements of this profound tradition are in danger of extinction.

Born in Iraq in 1958, Hamid Al-Saadi's artistic, musical and scholarly journey with the Iraqi *maqam* began from childhood, inspired by his avid love of the Iraqi and Baghdadi culture, the Arabic language, music and poetry. **Muhammed Al-Gubbenchi** – probably the most influential *maqam* reciter in history – considered Al-Saadi to be the "ideal link to pass on the *maqam* to future generations."

Afro-Brazilian berimbau musical bow ensemble joined by Capoeira martial artists

Formed in 2013, **Arcomusical** is a world music ensemble reimagining the Afro-Brazilian berimbau through a repertoire of unique, powerful, original concert chamber music. They will be joined by special guests **Matt Ulery** (double bass) and **Mestre Lobinho** & **Ann Arbor Capoeira Cordão de Ouro Mangalot** (Brazilian art form derived from elements of dance, martial arts, and acrobatics).

Although the berimbau is a well-known instrument in Brazil, most people in the United States remain unaware of this instrument family and its elegant beauty and simplicity. Musical bows are the most popular and widespread traditional string instrument found throughout sub-Saharan Africa, and the berimbau made its way to Brazil via the Transatlantic slave trade.

The berimbau's closest relatives are found in southern Africa, specifically in the Portuguese speaking countries of Angola and Mozambique.

When faced with the challenges of recent times, we thought "outside-the-box," creating two amazing music projects with the help of local organizations and area musicians.

RESONANCE MUSIC PROJECT

In partnership with the **Kalamazoo Institute of Arts** *Unveiling American Genius* exhibit, local musicians created short recorded works in response to selected artwork.





